Everyone had exciting ideas of how we are going to make the poppies, and we can't wait to see them all displayed opposite the memorial, in November.

Marco Polo Class

It's been another fantastic and engaging week in Marco Polo class, packed with hands-on learning, thoughtful discussion, and excellent teamwork. In English, we focused on writing instructions, starting with a fun activity where the children gave verbal explanations to fold origami. They did brilliantly, using clear and precise language—well done! In maths, we tackled long division, and WOW—what a week! The perseverance shown was outstanding, and everyone has made amazing progress in understanding the steps involved. History led us into a powerful topic: the Civil Rights Movement in America. We explored some incredibly brave stories of Black Americans, who fought to end segregation and claim their rights—this sparked thoughtful and respectful class discussions. In PE, we worked on our long jump and triple jump skills, with a focus on technique and control. Science introduced us to the world of bacteria—including how not all bacteria are bad! We explored immunity, how bacteria spreads, and even ran an

experiment using slices of bread touched with dirty vs. clean hands to observe mould growth over time. In computing, the children started making a ghost-catching game on Scratch, applying their coding knowledge in a fun and creative way. DT took a creative twist as we designed posters for our upcoming parent coffee morning—some really eye-catching and thoughtful designs were made. In geography, we explored the serious issue of deforestation in the Amazon Rainforest, discussing why it happens and the devastating effects it has on ecosystems, wildlife, and communities. Finally, in Life Skills, we learned how to find direction without a compass; we took our learning outside and had a go at identifying North, South, East, and West out on the field—great use of observation and critical thinking. Cat Class

I had the pleasure of seeing all the children in Cat class and most of Okapi enjoying a talk this week on British Sugar. We were told that of their 1,500 employees, many of them are in fact neurodiverse and they have a very strong diversity and inclusion policy. One of the quotes on their website video was "When people feel valued, they feel a sense of purpose." At Selwyn, behind the scenes, we have 1 hours' worth of staff meetings every day, 30 minutes in the morning and again in the afternoon, and we then have another 1.5 hours after school on Tuesdays. We spend that time getting to know our staff and showing how valued they are. We are so proud of all our staff, and how they all are working together to support your children to have a brighter future. Staff at Selwyn embrace our young people's neurodiversity and, having such variety of minds throughout the various classes, makes working here so appealing. Our staff choose to work here; they are all skilled enough to work anywhere but right now we value them here with us. They, like British Sugar workers, take their sense of purpose and work so hard; having fun with the young people, supporting the teaching and learning, sometimes answering phones in the office, sometimes serving lunches, a real mixed bag. After the talk, I heard children wondering how old they would have to be to work at British Sugar because they



could, even though they have autism, or ADHD, or just because they like sugar! I find it so refreshing that large companies can see the benefits of having an interesting mix of minds on their staff that they can value, just as we value our staff. Cats have enjoyed playing a new instrument in music recently in the form of boom whackers - plastic tubes of varying length that make a note as you hit them on a carpet. The children play them together and follow the notes that are needed as they appear on the Smartboard; we have created mini orchestras. It has warmed staff hearts seeing the control and concentration that the children have shown while playing. There was much spontaneous applause from cat class adults, which left us a bit dewy eyed to be honest! Have a good weekend. Mrs Angell

Okapi Class

We have had a positive week of learning in Okapi Class. In English, we have been diving into debate texts — exploring their structure and learning how to build balanced arguments. The young people have tackled some big questions, including: Should *Diary of a Wimpy Kid* be considered a valuable book for young readers? Should we invest more in space exploration? Should children be encouraged to play football? Should farming remain a priority, or should we shift to high-tech food solutions? and is it okay for children to eat at McDonald's or is home-cooked food always the better option? These discussions sparked lots of curiosity and respectful, thoughtful



debate. What do you think about these topics? They are great conversation starters at home too. We were also very

lucky to welcome a visitor from British Sugar, who shared fascinating insights into the world of sugar production. The young people were full of questions and really enjoyed learning about how sugar is made and used in everyday life. In geography, we have been creating fact files on countries from around the world — exploring maps, comparing cultures, and investigating key features. A brilliant way to grow our global awareness! And finally, our current favourite game is Tower Collapse (similar to Jenga) — lots of fun and fantastic for building focus and teamwork. Wishing you all a wonderful weekend! Mr Noone.
