#### **Marco Polo Class**

We've had a fantastic week back in Marco Polo class. In English, we've begun exploring historical non-fiction through *The Diary of Anne Frank*. We've been getting to know Anne's character through her early entries and have started imagining how we might feel if we had to go into hiding like she did. In maths, we've been working on understanding ratios and converting them into fractions—everyone showed brilliant focus. In history, we kicked off our new topic on the Industrial Revolution, learning key dates and vocabulary, asking brilliant questions about what we want to find out and designing front covers for our topic books. On Tuesday morning, I talked through the risk assessment with the young people and TAs, we have made a large version for the wall of the room for everyone to refer to. The class understood the risks and since using the swing they understand the benefits and they have realised that they also need to manage unexpected risks while using it. They took on board the rules for using the swing and have been very sensible as they realise that if the rules are not followed then the swing will not stay. Having such a seemingly simple addition to our building has taught the young people so many skills in such a short time - risk management, how to use a sensory swing, how to improve, how to follow rules, and most importantly they have really proved themselves to be able to take on board the responsibility for the safety of themselves and others in the room while the swing is in use. (Not to mention the fun they have had!) One young person said to me that he felt like he could fall asleep in it. Many thanks to Mr Wollaston, our site manager, for installing it during half term - drilling down from the loft in building 1 with only a very small gap, to crawl along. This week saw the children reading a text all about chess and then they answered a range of comprehension questions about it; they then learnt about non chronological reports and selected their own games to write about in that style. Our art lesson saw us learning about the artist Bridget Riley - the children enjoyed the abstract style and her optical illusions and had a go at making some of their own art in her style; they were able to see that a simple series of lines and clever shading can create the most amazing optical illusions, which they were proud of. The children had an introduction to Scratch in computing, and all were pleased of their achievements in programming. Our RE lesson bought much discussion and debate on the theme of finding out how religious activity in today's world has been affected by past and by traditions; this bought much interest which led to spirituality, events in history linked to religions and things going on across the world nowadays. The class were so engaged and keen to listen and contribute to the discussion with their thoughts. ## **Okapi Class**

It has been a real joy welcoming the young people of Okapi Class back after the half term break. The classroom has been filled with big smiles and positive energy as we've eased back into our routines. This week, we've spent time reconnecting with one another through creative play, which has brought lots of laughter and teamwork. Even the adults couldn't resist getting involved in the fun. around the world, building both our geographical knowledge and our confidence using reference tools. I hope you all have a restful weekend! Mr Noone.














# **Otzi Class**

It has been a great start to the term here in Otzi. A few things stand out from the week. Firstly, we spent an afternoon this week looking at Kinder Scout Trespass and the Right to Roam movement. Whilst

researching the history of land ownership and access in the UK, the paired groups all became fascinated by the illegality of the protests. Many students felt that - no matter how worthy the cause - protesters should never resort to illegal action: something which we tested against a host of historical examples (suffragettes, the civil rights movement in the US, Just Stop Oil). Second was an art and maths activity that involved drawing an obscure object from a mystery box guided only by vague, shape-based descriptions. It was quite an enlightening and amusing experience. Simple items like a cylindrical fishing float proved the most difficult for listeners to capture. Finally, following our work on the Rights of the Child last term, we looked at how the pupils understood their own educational rights, needs and requirements. It gave everyone chance to talk about how their previous experiences in education had shaped some of their attitudes and feelings, and what they



needed in the class to make them feel more able to learn without stress. Have a lovely weekend! Mr Nightingale.
