Kelly Class


This week, Kelly Class has been busy across all subjects! In English, pupils explored Shakespeare and wrote impressive persuasive paragraphs on his relevance today. Maths lessons focused on rounding and estimating with decimal numbers, especially in real-life money contexts. In science, the class continued their study of light, diving into refraction and how light behaves through different materials. P.E. lessons emphasised teamwork and tactics, while geography explored map skills. In history, students learned about the Plague, and in Life Skills, they enjoyed making breakfast sandwiches. Dahl Class

This week in Dahl class, we have been looking at the Solar system. We made our own out of play dough and straws, but it was quite difficult trying to get the planets to be different sizes; however, this was a great way to visualise the Solar System. Dahl class also showed off their cooking skills this week as they all cooked sausages and bacon and learnt to use a frying pan. They also learnt that sometimes oil is not needed to cook meat, as its own juices work well. Students had to decide if they wanted an egg in their sandwich and whether they wanted toast or just bread - there were some amazing results. Dahl class have been getting used to some different teachers in their class for the different curriculum areas: Miss Rixson is teaching them English, where they are looking at the Gothic genre







and Miss Joy is teaching them science, where they are looking at states of matter. Dahl class now have their new tables and the classroom is looking very smart! Miss Anderson

In science we have explored how light waves bend through water with a fun experiment in which we reversed images by viewing them through water. We have also started Doctor Faustus by Christopher Marlowe, and it has already initiated lots of conversations about the temptations and pitfalls of doing anything for money and fame! Frenchie Class

We've had another wonderful week of learning and creativity! In English, the children explored Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves, thinking carefully about the morals of the story and its features, before being inspired to plan and write their own exciting cave adventures. In maths, we tackled subtraction with exchanges and worked on estimating numbers, applying our skills to real-life situations like shopping and budgeting. In geography, the class collaborated to create a stunning piece of river art, adding in key human features such as fishing boats, mills, farm animals, crops, and even a castle to guard against invaders! In history, we discovered the fascinating world of Greek gods and goddesses, before inventing our own mythical deities. In science, we learnt how the Earth's axis creates seasons, and the children had great fun designing paper helicopters to see whose could descend the slowest; this sparked brilliant discussions about air resistance and design choices.

The biggest highlight of the week, though, has been seeing the children playing so happily together at breaks and lunchtimes—not only with each other, but with other classes too. Hamilton Class

This week in Hamilton class we have introduced the skeletal system to our young people and listened to a catchy tune to help us to remember the different bones, where they are on the body and to remember that there are 206 bones in our body in total. We enjoyed a team building football match outside and it was lovely to see Hamilton class passing and encouraging each other to shoot at the goal. In English, we have continued with our reading of *Frankenstein*, the play version, and enjoyed a drama activity where we were in role and asking key questions to gain a better understanding of character personalities and opinions. We have focused on the contrasting characters and how this helps us to understand key themes in the play. Respectful discussions were had in PSHE around the topic of community diversity and cohesion and Hamilton class listened and responded to each other's opinions,

During their MFL lesson, they sang along to French songs and took great amusement when a staff member translated a song about a



crocodile. I have to say the tune was very catchy! History continues to be a favourite among the young people and they were all very interested with who launched the NHS and the many advancements it has made. The students showed great maturity while researching ideas for a class display on Black history month and were particularly interested by Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King. Finally, volleyball continues to be a popular choice of game at break and lunch times and matches are a mixture of competitiveness, laughter (usually at staff) and enthusiasm.
