This week, we explored different areas of learning across the curriculum. In maths, we developed our understanding of fractions of amounts, using practical activities to help us divide and share numbers. In English, we focused on punctuation in scripts. Otzi Class

We were marching to war in Otzi again this week. In English, we continued exploring the imagery and meaning of two very opposing poems on the First World War, digging through the bleakness of Wildred Owen's haunting dreams. In history, we learnt about appeasement and the good intentions that unfortunately allowed Nazi Germany to seize land and re-arm. There was a bit of fun, too! In science, we continued exploring metals. Pupils were divided into groups and asked, in turn, to pick real-life metallic house-hold objects that they judged would



be magnetic due to their composition. We tested the results. The results told us a lot about how different metals are used and also yielded an interesting fact: 5ps and 10ps made after 2012 are magnetic, those before are not! Language learning fever continues in Otzi as pupils are trying to improve their scores in the application we are using. They began by diving into a cookery lesson where they prepared burgers from scratch, experimenting with different herbs and spices to enhance flavour and presentation. This practical session not only taught them valuable culinary skills but also encouraged teamwork and curiosity about how simple ingredients could combine to create something delicious. During English, the students made impressive progress during their non-fiction unit. The class analysed camera angles and shots while exploring the wasteful nature of human beings. While analysing a clip of the visual text, students examined how camera techniques can shape





audience perception and highlight important messages about environmental issues. This thoughtful analysis sparked meaningful discussions about overconsumption. Meanwhile, in Maths, students applied formulas to calculate and solve problems involving the perimeter and area of triangles.

Science continues to be one of the highlights of the week. The students carried out their own experiment, creating a hypothesis, and writing up their own evaluation. Not an easy task by any means but the young people rose to the challenge.





Art lessons saw young people working collaboratively towards creating a moving dragon that blends modern 3D technology with traditional Chinese dragon designs. The class researched Chinese dragons and started to list the materials that they need to create their 3D moveable design. The young people have navigated another busy and productive week with resilience and confidence. It has been lovely to see new relationships forming and listen to their interests and dreams.
