Darwin Class

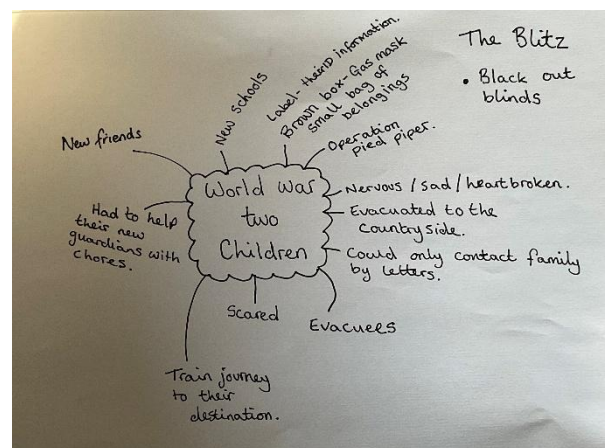
Darwin class had a productive and engaging week filled with learning across multiple subjects. In English, they focused on writing a persuasive speech about the importance of recycling and caring for our planet. They displayed their ability to use a range of effective persuasive techniques, including emotive language, statistics and many more. They showed a thoughtful consideration of environmental issues and demonstrated an ability to express their ideas with clarity and conviction. Their speeches highlighted not just why recycling matters, but also how small individual actions can contribute to a healthier, more sustainable world.

In maths, students spent time working with bar charts and analysing different sets of data; they practised plotting

information accurately, labelling axes, and interpreting what the graphs showed. This allowed them to strengthen their understanding of how data can be represented visually. The young people approached the tasks with curiosity and care, showing growing confidence in handling data and presenting it clearly.

This week in history, the class explored the lives of children during World War II, recognising the meaning of evacuees and evacuation and gaining insight into the challenges young people faced at the time. In French, they enjoyed learning Christmas-themed vocabulary to celebrate the festive season; their confidence is growing with each session, and they are eager to try out their new vocabulary in conversations. It has been wonderful to see their excitement and willingness to support one another as they develop their language skills.

Overall, Darwin demonstrated excellent focus, creativity, and reasoning skills throughout the week. Their growing confidence in expressing ideas across subjects and interpreting information shows them to be well-rounded learners who are continually developing.
